







Kansas Education Opportunity Scholarship

- Need-based scholarship assists incoming freshmen who are First Generation College students or dependents of KS certified teachers (K-12)
- Available at publics, privates, community, and technical colleges
- * Award: \$1,850/year; renewable for 4 consecutive years (undergrad only)
- Application Deadline: May 1
 - Must file FAFSA and state application
 - Must maintain 2.0 GPA and enroll full-time



Kansas Promise Act Scholarship

- Assists with two-year degrees or certificate programs in certain high wage, critical need fields.
- Available at community colleges, technical colleges, and certain 4-year institutions that offer eligible 2-year programs
- Recipients must be Kansas residents and U.S. citizens

Kansas Promise Act Scholarship (cont.)

- Last dollar scholarship
 - calculated after other grant and scholarship aid is applied
 - covers tuition, required fees, and <u>required</u> books/supplies only (no housing, transportation costs)
- * Maximum benefit up to \$20,000 or 68 hours, whichever occurs first
- To renew
 - must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress, enroll at least part-time, and complete the FAFSA each year
 - Scholarship will auto-renew until the college marks the student as graduated
- Must complete program within 36 months of first scholarship*
- Must enter into an agreement to live and work in Kansas for 2 consecutive years after completion of program*

KS Promise will turn into a loan if program completion and service requirements are not met

Hero's Scholarship (tuition waiver)

- Eligible dependents or spouses of deceased/disabled military personnel/public safety officers, or prisoners of war
- Waives tuition and required fees at any public college in Kansas
- Up to 10 semesters of undergraduate coursework
- Separate application with required documentation
 - deadlines listed on webpage



General Web Search Safety Tips

- Read everything before applying
- Search Better Business Bureau
- Check for additional requirements
 - Likes, links, & popularity
 - Protect intellectual property!
 - Fees, "Guaranteed" scholarships or "Free" seminars

If it sounds too good to be true it probably is

In 2021, about 68% of available jobs in the US required at least some college

By 2031, that percentage is forecast to reach 72%; 42% of those will require a bachelor's degree
